#### **NOTE 1 – PURPOSE AND ORGANIZATION**

Operation Military Embrace, Inc. (the Organization) is organized for the purpose of assisting injured Active Duty Marines, Corpsmen, Sailors, Airmen and Soldiers with legal expenses associated with disability claims and disability ratings as well as combat-related criminal charges. In addition, financial grants are provided to assist and support injured Active Duty personnel and/or their families with their normal day-to-day living expenses where the need exists. The mission of the Organization is to show appreciation by providing support to our wounded military and raising public awareness of the difficulties and challenges related to our wounded military's care and their families. The organization is supported by donations from American citizens.

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Organization conform to generally accepted accounting principles for non-profit organizations. The significant policies are:

#### Basis of Accounting:

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

#### Basis of Presentation:

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

<u>Unrestricted net assets</u> are not restricted by donors, or the donor-imposed restrictions have expired. Board designated or appropriated amounts are reported as part of the unrestricted class since the Board has the authority to change or withdraw such designations or appropriations.

<u>Temporarily restricted net assets</u> contain donor-imposed restrictions that require the Organization to use or expend the assets as specified. The restrictions are satisfied either by the passage of time or by actions of the Organization. The Organization currently does not have any temporarily restricted net assets.

<u>Permanently restricted net assets</u> contain donor-imposed restrictions requiring the resources be maintained permanently, but generally allowing the Organization to part or all of the income derived from the donated assets for specified purposes. The Organization currently does not have any permanently restricted net assets.

## NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents:

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

#### Property and Equipment:

Furniture and equipment acquisitions in excess of \$1,000 are capitalized and recorded at cost. Donated assets are recorded at fair market value on the date of the gift. Depreciation is recorded using the straight-line method over estimated useful lives ranging from three to ten years.

#### Contributions:

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restriction. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restriction.

#### Donated Assets:

Donated equipment and other noncash donations are valued at estimated fair value at date of donation.

#### Donated Services:

The Organization reports revenue for the fair value of contributed services received where the services require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing these skills, and represent services that would have been purchased had they not been donated. During the year ended December 31, 2010, no such services met criteria for recognition in the financial statements.

#### Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Advertising:

Advertising is expensed as incurred. For the year ended December 31, 2010, advertising expense was \$4,088.

#### NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income Tax Status:

The Internal Revenue Service has determined the Organization to be exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been recognized. The Organization is not aware of any uncertain tax positions that would require disclosure or accrual in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The Organization is required to file an annual information report with the Internal Revenue Service on Form 990.

#### Concentration of Credit Risk:

The Organization places its cash accounts with FDIC insured financial institutions. At times, the account balances may exceed the FDIC insured limits. The Organization does not believe it is exposed to any significant credit risk with respect to cash.

#### Functional Allocation of Expenses:

The costs of providing the various programs and supporting activities of the Organization have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the program and supporting activities.
